OUR THREE SCHOLARS ARE OFF TO EBETSU

For three Gresham girls, school isn't going to be over this year in June as it is for their classmates. Instead the girls are packing their bags, getting on a plane and attending school in Gresham's sister city, Ebetsu, in Hokkaido, Japan. They will be continuing a long tradition between the sister cities that first began in the 1980s. The girls will arrive in Ebetsu and attend Ritsumeikan and Towanomori Sanai high schools for the next month. Japanese schools don't get out until the end of July. While the Japanese students will be winding down

their school year, Cassie, Yasmin and Tanith will be joining them.

Tanith Horning, a rising senior at Gresham High has been studying Japanese for the past 3 years. Yasmin Florez-Lopez, a 2016 graduate of Gresham, for 4 years, and their teacher, Ms. Hieggelke, says she thinks they are ready for the exchange experience. Cassie George is a 2016 graduate at Reynolds High and her teacher is Ms. Bieker. She too has been taking Japanese language for her whole high school career.

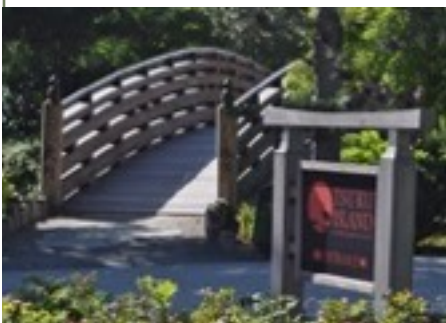

June 30th 2016 completes the 5th year of the adoption of Tsuru Island garden. This spring has been amazing for the garden in more ways than expected colors. New growth is on every plant and some of the growth includes the new fruits coming onto the plants for fall color. When looking at the list of accomplishments over those years, seeing something like "building the bridge" reminds us of how many volunteer hours were given and how many months it took to accomplish the task. Five years...think what will happen in 10 years. One of the things that will happen is maturity of the garden and our understanding of how to foster it for what we will leave behind in 30, 40 and 50 years for the community that follows us. One gets a glimpse of the maturity of some of the plant materials by looking at the plants that were original to the first garden 42 years ago. You are not looking for how tall or wide but the training of the shrubs, trees, vine or ground cover. How well we have done to make it perform as we intended through observation, pruning, general care and the role that it plays with the rest of the garden. Right along with this perspective we will also be watching through the years how we place and groomed the plant materials in reference to the other surrounding plant materials and the textures, size, colors and shapes as they blend together. After five years we have just finished the start. Now our goals include the fostering of the garden, that gem that all of us have worked so hard to make one of a kind, special, and something everyone can choose to enjoy in some way.

We hope to do this by establishing the endowment that along with volunteer programs we can establish available monies to allow for the garden to be given the care and attention that it will need. The "garden endowment" program will be established with the assistance of the board and other volunteers, over the next few years. It is necessary so that the deterioration of the garden over the past 42 years does not happen again. Sadafumi Uchiyama told Tomiko and I in the first 90 days of our journey that "if they like what they see, they will follow". I can only hope our job has accomplished that sentiment.

2011

Developed island design. Raised funds and gathered support. Adopted by GSCA (Gresham Sister Association) Started pulling weeds and other invasive plants.

2012

Revised garden design, installed drainage and irrigation.

Built 2 foot-bridges

2013

Paver walkways designed and built by Jim's son. Placed many boulders and planted many trees.

Began plans for azumaya*.

2014

Carved stream bed, created zen rock garden, finished paths and reopened the garden.

2015

Rebuilt bridge to island using purple heart wood.

2016

The azumaya project completed.

* An **azumaya** is a traditional arbor or summer pavilion found in formal Japanese gardens.

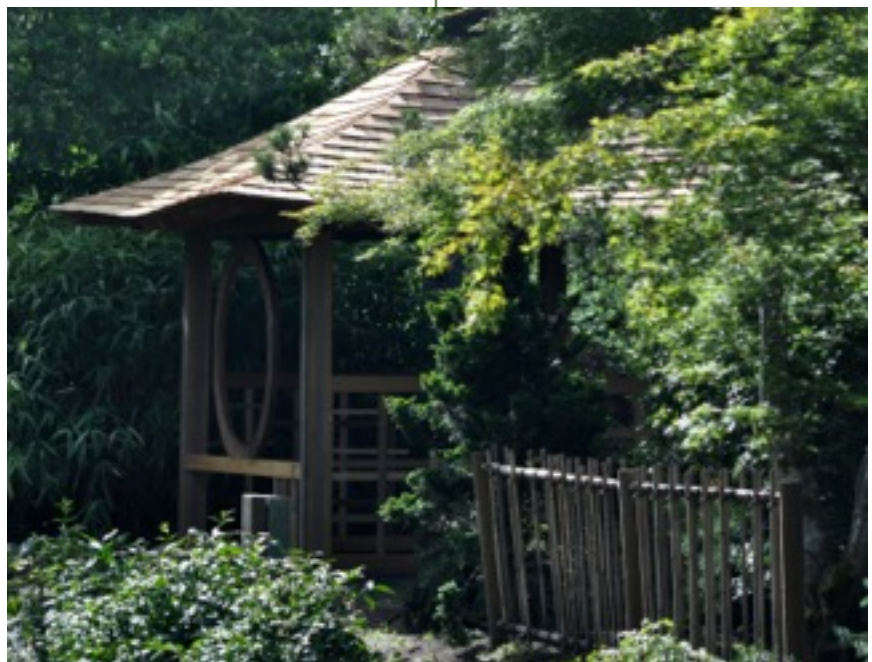
